

NARRATOR: ELOCTATE [Antihemophilic Factor (Recombinant), Fc Fusion Protein].

LANE: I like to run because I like the challenge that comes with it. The challenge of forcing your body to do what you didn't think it could do before. My name is Lane, and I have severe Hemophilia A. Growing up with hemophilia was difficult. I had a lot of bloody noses all the time, which caused the other kids around me to think I had this disease that they were going to get if they touched my blood or something. I really didn't have any friends, and I didn't try to make any, but all that changed in eighth grade when I met my friend Austin. We hung out. We played video games. He made me feel normal for the first time in my life. I was hesitant to tell Austin about my Hemophilia but just one day it slipped out. He asked me about the sharps container that was sitting in my room, and without thinking, I told him, "Oh, it's for the needles." After I told him, I thought he wasn't going to be my friend anymore, but all he said was, "Oh, that's weird." and he never brought it up again. The friends he had, it was obvious that he cared about them, and he was a guy who would do anything for those friends. I remember the day my mom came into my room with tears in her eyes to tell me that Austin had been diagnosed with terminal cancer and that they gave him two years to live. I was devastated. We were still in eighth grade, still young, and I was going to lose my best friend. Even when he was in the hospital, you would always just see a smile on his face and that helped me realize that if he can have a smile on his face while going through cancer, I can easily have a smile on my face while going through hemophilia. I've been running track for six years now. It's something I really enjoy doing, and I'm lucky enough to be able to run in college. I finally found my event, like the thing that I'm good at. When I run the 400, the only thing that goes through my mind is that I'm going to win. Whether I do or not, that's all that's going through my head. To be able to do the 400-meter, you have to be able to really listen to your body and know how your body reacts. I heard about ELOCTATE from my mom, who heard about it from a friend. She told me about prolonged half-life, which I was really excited about. When I went to talk to my doctor about transitioning to ELOCTATE, he talked to me about the benefits as well as the side effects. Chest tightness and difficulty breathing or signs of possible allergic reaction to ELOCTATE. Once I had the information, we both felt comfortable with me making the transition to ELOCTATE. When I made the change to ELOCTATE, my doctor and I discussed a prophylaxis schedule starting with every four days, working up to every five. My doctor and I feel that I'm protected from bleeds while using ELOCTATE. I haven't had any spontaneous bleeds since I made the change. That is just my experience. Everyone is different, so be sure to talk to your healthcare team before making the change to ELOCTATE. Most people think that track is just an individual sport. All they see is the one person running and that's it, but it goes much deeper than that. We have our teammates. We have our coach. We have our friends supporting us all the way through whether they're there or in the back of your mind. Having Hemophilia is a struggle, but I remembered what Austin had taught me that no matter what you go through, you can't just give up.

Tell your healthcare provider if you have or have had any medical problems, take any medicines, including prescription and non-prescription medicines, supplements, or herbal medicines, have any allergies, are breastfeeding, are pregnant or planning to become pregnant, or have been told you have inhibitors (antibodies) to Factor VIII. Allergic reactions may occur with ELOCTATE. Call your healthcare provider or get emergency treatment right away if you have any of the following symptoms: difficulty breathing, chest tightness, swelling of the face, rash, or hives. Your body can also make antibodies called, “inhibitors,” against ELOCTATE, which may stop ELOCTATE from working properly. The most frequently occurring side effects of ELOCTATE are headache, rash, joint pain, muscle pain, and general discomfort. These are not all the possible side effects of ELOCTATE. Talk to your healthcare provider right away about any side effect that bothers you or that does not go away, and if bleeding is not controlled after using ELOCTATE.
